Our income



Scotland


We've increased our support to charities in Scotland, providing high value donations and community grants.

Techniquest

We awarded £15,311 to Techniquest, helping them to deliver engaging STEM workshops for children in Primary Schools from disadvantaged areas throughout Wales.



Annandale **Transport Initiative**

Our £32,000 donation helped Annandale Transport Initiative buy a minibus to provide transport for isolated and disadvantaged people, giving them access to important appointments and activities.



Moffat Mountain Rescue

We donated £600 to Moffat Mountain Rescue in Scotland, helping them to buy equipment for a new support vehicle.



WellChild

A £20,000 donation supported WellChild's Helping Hands programme, which renovates the gardens and bedrooms of children with serious illnesses across the country.



Linkable

Linkable were awarded £5,282 to expand their activities for children with learning disabilities in Woking, ensuring even more people can benefit.



Project Ability

Project Ability received £3,000 to run visual art workshops for people with disabilities in Glasgow, aiming to improve motor skills, confidence and communication.



Open Country

We donated £11,649 to help Open Country buy a new vehicle and give people with disabilities access to the Yorkshire Dales



Blythe House Hospice

We gave £5,000 to Blythe House Hospice in High Peak, to provide beauty therapy sessions for elderly people with serious illnesses.





Community grants

We supported Families InFocus with a £4,530 donation to run a club for children with special educational needs in Essex.



Eureka!

Our donation of £15,545 helped Eureka! in Halifax deliver specialist creative play sessions and activities for young people with disabilities.



Age UK Hammersmith & Fulham

We donated £5,702 to Age UK Hammersmith & Fulham to run an upcycling project for older people, helping to reduce social isolation.



Milton Keynes Hospital Charity

Milton Keynes Hospital Charity received £48,581 to brighten up the children's unit and buy new sensory equipment so young people don't feel as nervous about attending appointments.

High value grants

Maggie's Cancer Centre

Maggie's Cancer Centres are there for anyone with any type of cancer and their families and friends, offering the practical, emotional and social support that people with cancer need. Professional staff are on hand to offer advice and help in a welcoming environment.

The centres are designed through the eyes of people living with cancer to ensure that the best possible environment can be provided. The centre in Edinburgh has become so essential that an extension is needed to cater for the high demand and support more people. This will comprise of three new rooms, more space in the kitchen and a revamped therapeutic garden.

Our £163,450 donation is supporting essential improvements to the roof and garden area with work soon to begin.

Glasgow Children's Hospital Charity

Glasgow Children's Hospital Charity works at the heart of the Royal Hospital for Children, raising money to ensure that young patients and their families receive the best possible care.

We donated £150,000 to buy and install a state-of-the-art fluorescence surgical microscope, the first of its kind in paediatric surgery in Scotland. The microscope has helped to enhance the capabilities of the hospital's surgical team and means that young patients receiving reconstructive, neurological, oncological and general surgery have the best chance of a positive outcome.

Due to the variety of specialist surgeries at the Royal Hospital for Children, upwards of 4,500 patients each year will benefit from the microscope, many of whom will receive life-changing care. "Thousands of children each year receive a high standard of care and support thanks to Glasgow Children's Hospital Charity. This new, state-of-the-art surgical microscope will positively impact the long term health of young patients for many years to come."

Enham Trust

The Enham Trust is a disability charity supporting over 8,500 people every year, giving them increased independence and choice in all aspects of their lives.

Following consultation with young people who use the service, the Enham Trust set out on a mission to create a vibrant, versatile and inclusive cafe at the heart of its facilities where almost three hundred disabled residents currently live.

The new hub will give residents somewhere to go to catch up with friends or family, take part in social activities and grab something to eat. A fully accessible and adaptable space, the principal aim is to create a social heart for the Enham Trust's disabled community.

A £98,877 donation from us will make it happen, and work is already underway to design and develop the new area.

Action for Children

Action for Children supports disadvantaged children across the UK. From birth until they are into their twenties, the charity helps children, young people and families facing difficult situations.

By offering disability services in local communities, Action for Children provides access to focused and specialist support. With this expertise children develop the basic skills that are essential for their lives, with the importance of play being a key part in expanding social and motor skills.

Our donation of £150,000 will redevelop the sensory gardens in ten respite centres, which provide short breaks for children and their families.

The donation will mean that disabled children and young people have access to a variety of sensory toys, equipment and experiences that support the development of their cognitive, social, communication and motor skills through outdoor play.

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
Alzheimer's Society

The Alzheimer's Society provides practical and emotional care for people living with dementia and supports research to help find a cure.

Their dementia guide is available for anyone who has recently been told they have dementia, helping people understand more about the condition and the treatments, support and services that are available. It includes information about how people can live as well as possible with dementia and helps them to make plans for the future.


This year, we're sponsoring the dementia guide with a £265,200 donation which will help to ensure that over 85,000 people can benefit from specialist resources over the next twelve months.

Royal British Legion Industries

The Royal British Legion Industries (RBLI) is a national charity supporting the Armed Forces community and those affected by disability, health conditions or social welfare needs.

RBLI is developing 24 specialised apartments to provide much needed accommodation for wounded, injured and sick veterans. The apartments will be fully adapted to provide long-term homes for ex-service personnel who have mobility needs. It will be based in the Royal British Legion Village in Kent – adding to the wide range of facilities and services already available in the area.


Our donation of £293,360 is helping RBLI to cover the full fixtures, fittings, flooring and furnishings in the 24 apartments and communal areas, ensuring residents can receive support in a high quality environment.

Julia's House

Julia's House is a children's hospice charity dedicated to bringing comfort and care to families across Dorset and Wiltshire.

The charity provides practical and emotional support, tailoring care to the needs of each individual child and providing frequent, regular care in their own homes, in the community and in the Dorset hospice.

Julia's House is creating Wiltshire's first purpose built children's hospice to provide respite and end of life care. Based in Devizes, the new hospice will enable Julia's House to reach more families, offering care and support when they need it most.

We have donated £238,975 to fund sensory equipment throughout the new hospice and the creation of a therapeutic garden, so that young people and their families have access to the best possible environment to support their care.

of individuals and communities, bringing people together to share experiences and develop relationships. Cyrenians has created a programme to increase opportunities for people from disadvantaged areas to learn new skills, take part in group activities and provide additional food for those in need.

A £198,976 donation provided the funding needed to make the project a reality.

Now, Cyrenians can redistribute more surplus food to disadvantaged local families, create more opportunities for young people to learn, expand its vital community of volunteers, and provide accredited training and skills development for people struggling to find their way in life.
